

A Request for Local Drug Store Bottles

I'm the editor of The Delmarva Blowpipe newsletter for the Delmarva Antique Bottle Club. I'm on a personal mission. My family owned drug stores in Washington, D.C. at the turn of the century until probably the late nineteen fifties. There were several different O'Donnell drug stores. This was not a chain but relatives that owned individual stores. I'm looking for bottles, memorabilia, etc. associated with these stores. My grandfather was a druggist by the name of John Murphy. He & my grandmother (Margaret O'Donnell Murphy) owned a drug store at 301 Pennsylvania Ave. SE. My great aunts & uncles also ran drug stores in various locations: 1444 Wisconsin Ave; 904 F Street NW; 1200 Wisconsin Ave. NW; 14th & Colorado Ave. NW; Wisconsin & P St., and 8th & G Streets, SE. The 8th & G Street SE store is now a part of the Smithsonian Turn-Of-The-Century Museum. They call it the Roach Drug Store. So in addition to O'Donnell I'm looking for anything with the names Murphy, Malone, or Roach from this era. There were all druggists that were married to an O'Donnell. Bottle Show Report

The Baltimore Bottle Club easily retained the title "Largest Bottle Show on the East Coast" with its 21st annual show and sale. Even forecasts of a huge snow storm could not deter dealers from filling approximately 300 sales tables at the March 4th show. Based on the paid attendance of over 1000 people, one might guess that buyers also ignored the weather. However, show organizers estimated that attendance could have exceeded 2000 if Mother Nature had cooperated. Serious collectors would not dream of letting meteorologists' warnings keep them from this show, but the buyers of inexpensive bottles apparently did stay home. About the only time I heard anyone express interest in low-end bottles was when a woman standing next to me dropped a \$1700 cobalt soda bottle on a couple of \$4 pontiled puffs. She apologized profusely for shattering the puffs while the dealer carefully inspected his prize soda, which appeared only slightly the worse for wear.

The Baltimore club's handling of the weather problem earned high marks from most dealers. Because of heavy snow to the North, New England dealers were allowed to leave the show early, and by 1 PM nearly half the tables were empty. While this did disappoint a few latecomers, most collectors found that they still had plenty of opportunities to exchange their cash for quality glass.
